How do I Identify Victims of Human Trafficking?

Identifying human trafficking victims is an important step in getting them the help they need. Some indicators concerning a potential victim include:

- Does the victim act fearful, anxious, depressed, submissive, tense, or nervous/paranoid?
- Does the victim defer to another person to speak for him or her?
- Does the victim show signs of physical and/or sexual abuse, physical restraint, confinement, or torture?
- Does the victim have few or no personal possessions?
- Can the victim freely contact friends or family?
- Is the victim allowed to socialize or attend religious services?
- Does the victim have freedom of movement?
- Does the victim work excessively long and/or unusual hours?

United States Department of State Defines Human Trafficking as:

All criminal actions that reduce, hold, or compel someone into service. This includes:

- ⇒ Forced Labor
- ⇒ Sex Trafficking
- ⇒ Bonded Labor
- ⇒ Involuntary Domestic Servitude
- ⇒ Child Sex Trafficking
- ⇒ Child Soldiers

The problem is larger than you think:

78% for labor slavery

22% for sex slavery

21 to 30 million people trapped in slavery

55% of slaves are women and girls

26 % of slaves are children

Slavery creates \$150 billion in profits Globally

One person is trafficked in the US every 10 minutes
