A. Personal Statement

I am presently a Research Scientist at the Institute for Child Health Policy and hold a position as an adjunct professor in the Master of Public Health Program at Nova Southeastern University in Broward, County, FL. I earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Human Development from Howard University (1999), Master of Public Health degree from the University of South Florida (2001), and earned a Doctorate of Education degree (June 2010). I have 10 years of experience in research and project management and all of my work to date has focused on conducting research and evaluating programs that seek to improve the health status of ethnic and racial minorities in the United States. Specifically, I assist in the coordination of local and national evaluation research designs, identify emerging research areas, write grants, develop budgets, implement projects, and facilitate data management and analysis as well as, teach and supervise Master of Public Health students. With the expertise that I have gained through both my educational and professional experiences, I will be able to thoroughly review the theoretical and methodological approach, cultural competency, and practical implementation guidelines for the holistic interactive intervention program. I have also participated in the collection and analysis of qualitative and quantitative data to answer specific research questions. My research practices are driven by sound theoretical models such as the *health belief model*, the *transtheoretical model*, and the *theory of planned behavior* (Glanz et al., 2002). My analytic skills include using statistical packages such as SPSS (quantitative software) and Ethnograph (qualitative software) and the use of grounded theory. I also have experiences in all phases of research, including searching the scientific literature, writing protocols, collecting and analyzing data, and disseminating results to local and national communities. I was also afforded the opportunity to co-author three manuscripts that have been accepted for publication in peer reviewed scientific journals. Specifically, my existing skills and abilities include: the planning and implementation of qualitative research protocols, such as the Organ Donation in the Black Community Research study (sponsored by the National Institutes of Health at Emory University's School of Public Health), the Prevention Research for African American women study (sponsored by the University of Florida Dean's Fund, Jacksonville Florida), the Preventing Abuse in Intimate Partner Relationships study (Sponsored by the Centers for Disease Control & Prevention) and the Broward Collaborative to

Reduce the Use of Substances, HIV and Hepatitis (Sponsored by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Administration).
