



Hurricane Season

Hurricane season is upon us. According to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, the Atlantic hurricane season runs from June 1 – November 30, reaching peak in mid-August through late October. Between 1970 and 2010, the Atlantic Ocean, Caribbean or Gulf of Mexico was threatened by an average of 11 tropical storms per season – 6 of which became hurricanes! It is essential that you prepare and you're aware of the coverage available to you in the event your location is deemed uninhabitable following a natural disaster such as a hurricane.

Before the Tropical Storm/Hurricane Season begins:

- Familiarize yourself with the school's Emergency Plan, Protocols and Procedures set forth by the school
- Always be aware of upcoming weather threats and discuss any travel plans with the school

During the Tropical Storm/Hurricane:

*The Natural Disaster Evacuation/Repatriation benefit does NOT cover pre-storm evacuations.

- Follow the school's Emergency Plan, Protocols and Procedures set forth by the school
- If school and government officials are recommending shelter in place and/or mandating evacuation, follow their recommendations.

Following the Tropical Storm/Hurricane:

- If the area in which you are located is deemed *Uninhabitable* by local/US government officials and On Call's security personnel and/or you are in danger of *Imminent Bodily Harm* and commercial transportation is unavailable, On Call International will evacuate you to the nearest safe haven.
- Once evacuated to the nearest safe haven and safe, On Call International will arrange one-way transportation back to your home. If transportation to your home is delayed due to flight availability, On Call International will arrange and pay for lodging at the nearest safe haven up to \$100 per day, for a maximum of 3 days.

*The Natural Disaster Evacuation/Repatriation benefit does NOT cover evacuation or repatriation for students affected by hurricanes or typhoons UNLESS:

- a. the path of the named storm deviates by a distance of greater than 200 miles within a 72 hour period from the path forecast by a national recognized meteorological service
- b. or less than 72 hours' advance notice of a potential landfall for a named storm exists.

Imminent Bodily Harm means: the existence of any condition or circumstance, which cannot be avoided through normal precautionary measures, and could reasonably be expected to cause death or serious physical harm to You, if You were to remain in the affected area where the Political or Natural Disaster event has occurred.

Uninhabitable means: your location is deemed unfit for residence, as determined by ON CALL security personnel in accordance with U.S. and local authorities, due to lack of habitable shelter, food, heat and/or potable water AND no suitable supplemental housing is available within 100 miles of the disaster site
