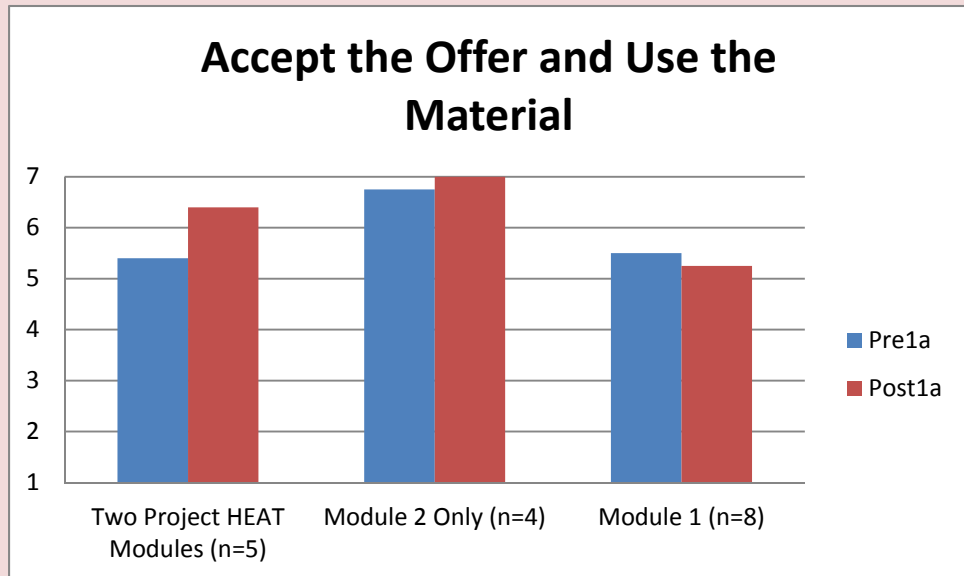

Likelihood of Adopting Curriculum Item #s: 1a



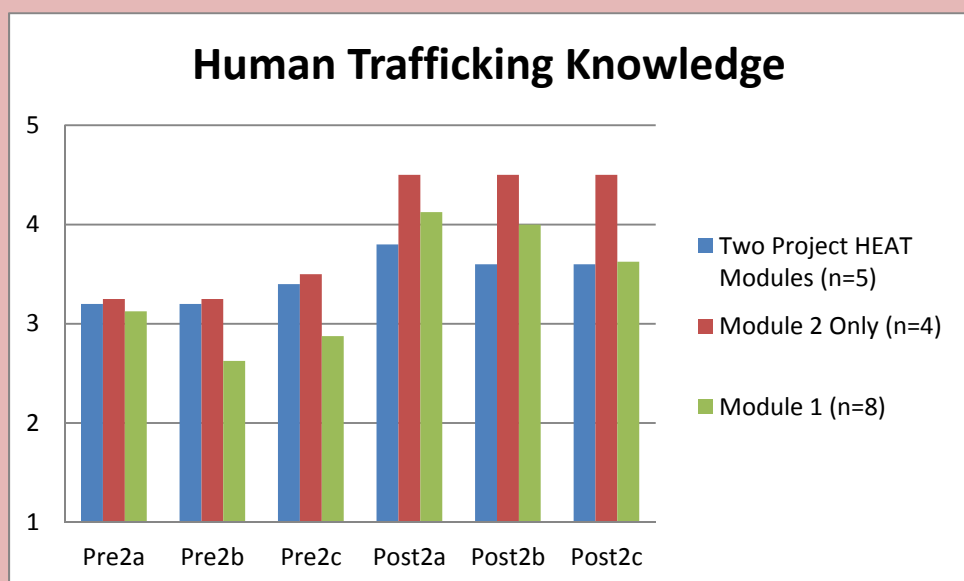
These data describe a mean difference across and within groups.

- ❖ Across Groups Pre Scores Range: 5.4 to 6.75.
- ❖ Across Groups Post Scores Range: 5.25 to 7.
- ✚ Within Group Pre-Post Scores Previous Project: 5.4, 6.4.
- ✚ Within Group Pre-Post Scores Module 2: 6.75, 7.
- ✚ Within Group Pre-Post scores Module 1: 5.25, 5.5.

Module 1 did not demonstrate a post score gain.

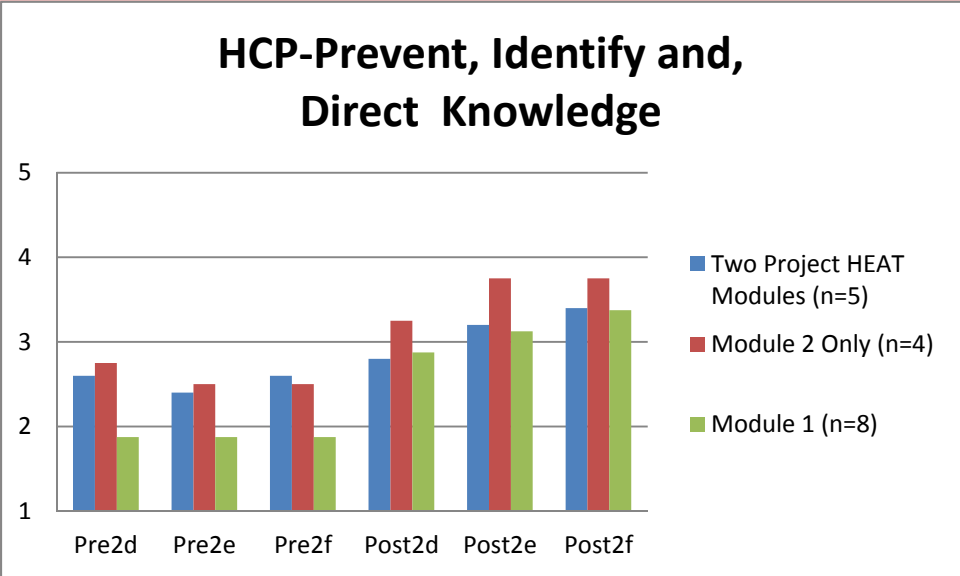
Human Trafficking Knowledge

General Human Trafficking Item #s: 2a, 2b, 2c



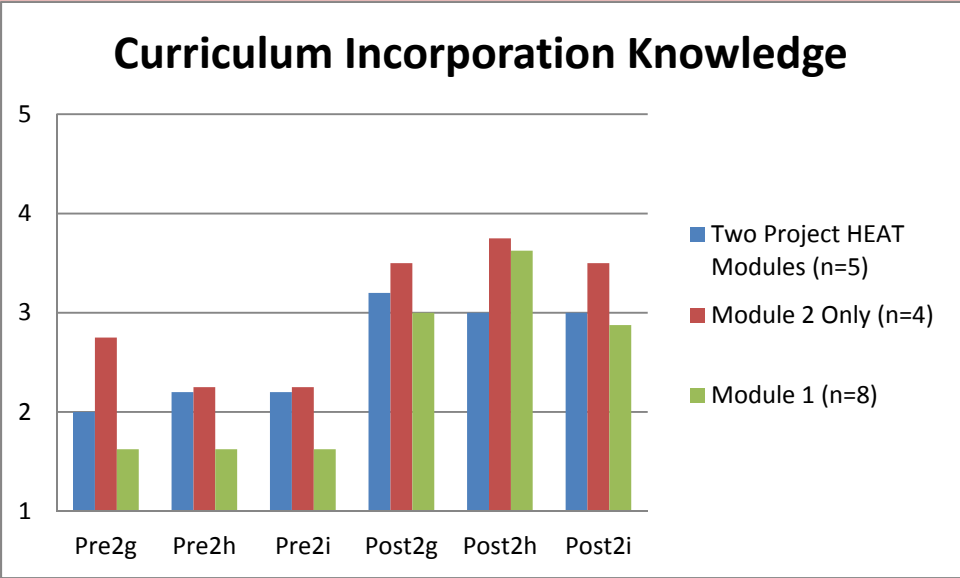
These data demonstrate a trend of increased knowledge across all groups. Module 2 participants demonstrated the greatest mean post test score gain on each item.

These data demonstrate a trend of increased knowledge across all groups. Module 2 participants demonstrated the greatest mean post test score gain on each item.

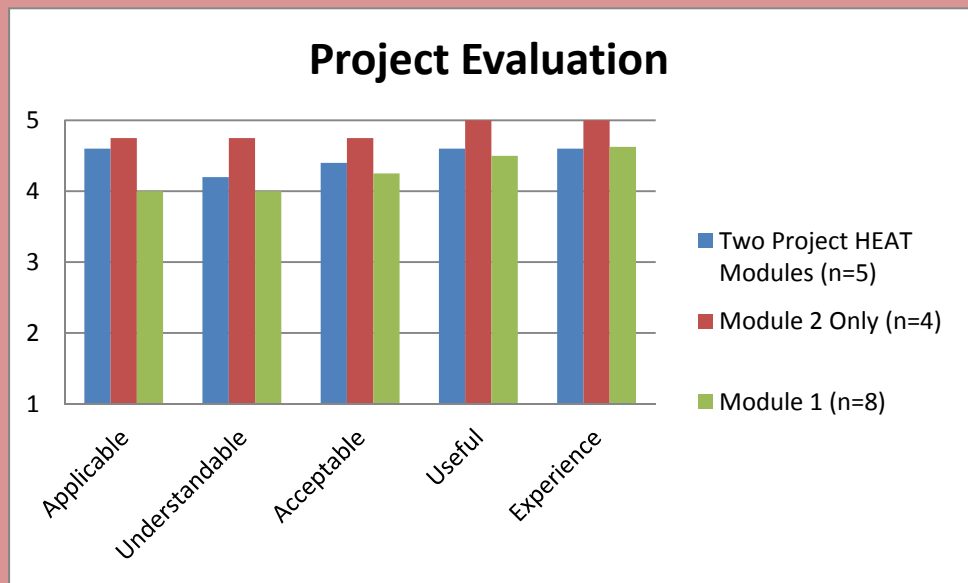
General Item #s: 3a, 3b, 3c

- I. Participants reported they are “thinking” about updating their curriculum in the next six months.
- II. There was no change from pre-post responses for Two Project HEAT Modules and Module 2, 80% and 75%, respectively.
- III. These pre-post scores are greater than the 62.5% of Module 1 participants.

Human Trafficking Item #s: 4a, 4b, 4c

- I. Participants reported they are “thinking” about updating their curriculum in the next six months.
- II. There was no change from pre-post responses for Two Project HEAT Modules and Module 2, 100% and 75%, respectively.
- III. These pre-post scores are greater than the 62.5% of Module 1 participants.
