SLCE Theoretical Framework

Service + Civic Engagement

Due to the nature of the work, we believe citizenship is a spectrum. Therefore, we utilize the **Active Citizen Continuum** which describes four stages of personal development. As we learn more about social issues we move from simply being a member, unconcerned about societal issues toward becoming an active citizen who prioritizes the greater community in their values and life choices.

Leadership Models

SLCE utilizes the Social Change Model (SCM) of Leadership Development to approach leadership as a purposeful, collaborative, values-based process that results in positive social change. We also teach Emotional Intelligence as a way to be aware of oneself and those around us. together, these models provide a framework that believes leadership is a process, not a position and is inclusively accessible to all people.

Razor's Edge Leadership Scholars Program

The Razor's Edge Leadership Scholars Program is a 4 year curricular and co-curricular program for First Time in College students entering Nova Southeastern University. Students are invited to put their skills into action and get involved on campus in progressive leadership roles as they matriculate through the university and the program

Over the course of the year, Razor's Edge Leadership students hosted 473 unique students and 874 total students to attend NSU community events and programs. These first-year and upper-class students have found ways to connect to campus through involvement fairs, cultural and diversity events, and even career development opportunities. By bringing students to these events, REL students are building meaningful relationships with students across campus that allow them to increase campus vibrancy and help students feel a sense of belonging at NSU.

President's 64

Established by NSU's 6th President, George L. Hanbury II, Ph.D., The President's 64 is an elite body of student leaders whose purpose is to strengthen the relationship between NSU and its community. This organization is comprised of 64 hand-selected undergraduate, graduate, and professional students who provide targeted feedback to the president, serve as student ambassadors, and representatives at University events.

Celebration of Excellence

On February 11, 2023, NSU hosted the Celebration of Excellence. This event served to honor community members for their contributions to the NSU and surrounding communities. In recognition of all that President's 64 does for the university, President Hanbury invited the entire P64 cohort to attend and participate in the event. P64 students enjoyed the full programming of the event, such as performances by the Shark Gold singing group and the presentation of Shark statues to the university's donors. The President's 64 members also met with a number of the event's guests that serve the community.

Emerging Leaders Experience (ELE)

The Emerging Leaders Experience is a great undergraduate opportunity for graduate students to grow and hone their skills as a leader. This semester we have incorporated the sessions where anyone is welcome to attend any session. In class we go over the Social Change Model, exploring different aspects that dive deeper towards a better understanding of yourself, other people in a teamwork and organization, and ultimately society in a cultural and impactful context. Sessions include interactive in class discussions and activities, integrating the learning material for further understanding. Commitment and completion of this course results in a graduation pin, certificate, and tshirt! Sessions are held weekly, every Wednesday from 1:00-1:50 PM in Rosenthal 204 (Impact Zone). Annual Disney Imagination Campus Leadership Retreat



The Office of Student Leadership and Civic Engagement hosted the first Disney Imagination Campus Leadership Retreat from February 26 until March 1, 2023. NSU's 20 undergraduate student participants took part in two sessions "Leadership the Disney Way" and "Teamwork the Disney Way". Both morning trainings took place in Epcot and we were hosted by Disney Cast Members. Each session was interactive and challenged students to work in groups to solve problems and complete tasks. Sessions were hosted in Epcot and included team scavenger hunts, leadership and teamwork activities, and tours and discussions "backstage". One of the most memorable and informative sessions was led by a Disney Cast Member who shared her leadership journey at Disney reflecting a great deal on her relationships with her supervisors and co-workers. She explored how her success was supported by her managers' active engagement and advocacy for her to take on additional roles. This cast member was able to demonstrate how as a leader you should know your team and advocate for their success and place individuals in positions they either excelled in or provide development opportunities to assist in cast member growth.

Overall the retreat was a success and students were able to enjoy the Disney Theme Parks after each session included. Participants reported that the sessions were extremely informative and provided them with an approach to leadership that is employee and customer driven and based on group dynamics and individual member development. We look forward to hosting the 2nd Annual Disney Imagination Campus Leadership Retreat next spring break.

Ignited by Divya Mullapudi, an undergraduate student, SLCE partnered with the Active Sharks Council and the Alvin Sherman Library to talk to NSU students about censorship.

Volunteer Programs:

One-time Volunteer Groups

Day of Service: 2–5-hour service project with a community partner, normally takes place once a month on a Saturday.

Night of Service: 2-3-hour service project with a community partner, normally takes place twice a month during a weekday or night.

All Fins In: Campus wide service event where at least 10 groups of 10-30 students engage in service projects in and around Broward County.

Weekend or Weeklong Projects with a Volunteer Group

Sharks and Service: A group of students, normally 10-15, go on local, national, and international service trips during scheduled breaks in the school year, such as Spring break.

This wholistic experience includes education, service, reflection, and group bonding while partnering with a community affiliate.

Continuous volunteering by Individual Students

Experiential Learning: Individual students receive credit for volunteering with a single organization for 40 or 80 hours

Volunteer Fair: Come to NSU to recruit students to volunteer with your organization! This year, we're planning on hosting a volunteer fair during Weeks of Welcome at the end of August 2022

Nature Club - This year, Nature Club decided to hold one massive service event with as many student organizations as they could. They had a trash cleanup at **Wolf Lake Park**, which due to its popularity means that a lot of trash tends to accumulate there. The turnout was fantastic. In total, over 14 NSU organizations were represented at the Wolf Lake Cleanup!

Pre-SLP Society – The Pre-SLP (Pre – speech-language pathologists) Society partnered with **Broward County Parks** to spend a Saturday morning partaking in direct service and philanthropy. The service event comprised of picking up any trash throughout the park or on trails and removing any other foreign materials that directly impacted the park or its environment.

Pakistani Student Association – The Pakistani Student Association partnered with **Project Downtown** in October to focus on 6 of the 17 UN sustainable development goals including Zero Hunger, No Poverty, and Reduced Inequalities.

The walk raises community awareness about suicide prevention and volunteers helped set up and assisted in the check-in of participants as well as educating them about the beads that were being given out.

They partnered with Dania Beach to have a beach clean-up. This included picking up trash on the beach and the surrounding area.



Roles within SAS:

<u>Participant</u>: A participant is a NSU student who is interested in utilizing their academic breaks to make a difference in the world. They participate in the education, service, and reflection provided by the Site Leaders while being immersed into a new community and culture.

<u>Site Leader</u>: A Site Leader is a NSU student with previous service experience who plans a SAS trip with co-site leader. Together, they plan, facilitate, and guide a group of students through education sessions, service projects, reflection discussions, and bonding activities that address a particular social issue.

<u>Advisor</u>: The SAS Advisor is either a NSU graduate student or staff member who assists in all education, service, and reflection activities while overseeing the participants on the trip.

2022 Winter Break SAS Trip to New Orleans, LA

Social Issue: Disaster Relief and Flood Prevention

During winter break, a group of students touched down in New Orleans to participate in a service project. They worked with Youth Rebuilding New Orleans organization which started as a response to Hurricane Katrina. YRNO was founded with the focus of bringing together the youth of New Orleans to help rebuild houses and neighborhoods that were heavily impacted by the Category 5 hurricane of 2005. Years later, there are still houses that were never rebuilt so YRNO buys up the land and either renovates or builds the houses back. Students worked on two projects, the first was installing a French Drain and the second was assisting with finishing touches on a newly built house in the 5th ward.

The group also had the chance to experience the city and visited the state museum and the French Quarter. They had a lot of fun exploring, shopping, and of course, eating beignets.

2023 MLK Site Leader Training in Fort Lauderdale, FL

Social Issue: Equality for All

Site Leaders participated in a service and training program over Martine Luther King Weekend. Students learned tangible facilitation skills, engaged in reflection, and participated in service together throughout our local community.

2023 Spring Break Trip to St. Louis, MO

Social Issue: Women's Rights and Women's Health

For spring break 2023, Sharks and Service (SAS) traveled to St. Louis, Missouri to explore the social issues of women's health and mental wellbeing. Our community partner, LifeWise, is a St. Louis based organization that supports all populations, ranging from babies to older adults. We learned about the medical and environmental disparities that exist and the medical history of the city, including how it currently has no public hospitals and all the black-ran hospitals have shut down. The week also included a poverty simulation and intergroup monopoly where income disparities became abundantly clear.

Our service included restocking the market with low-cost food items and replenishing the bodega that provides toiletries and clothes at a reduced cost. We also got to participate in gardening to prepare for LifeWise's upcoming garden programs with students where they grow food. The week also included a health panel with local professionals in the fields of social work, asylum-seeker services, Planned Parenthood, and a local hospital NICU. It was enlightening to hear about their experiences and how health disparities appear in different populations. On the last day, everyone got to enjoy exploring the Arch, City Museum, and Science Center to get a taste of St. Louis culture!

2023 Summer Break Trip to Costa Rica

Social Issue: Community Development and Healthy Living

For our summer service trip, we are working with Cultural Connections & Volunteers (CCV) in the small rural community of Alajuela, Costa Rica. The community partner has partnered with the Slum community of Los Lagos to make a difference in this community through small construction projects. The homes are typical slum homes built with whatever they can find: tin, cardboard, wood, etc. Therefore, this home encounters dirt floors and hijacked electricity, some have running water, and they must cook on open fires

The participants will work to make improvements to local homes by building Indigenous-type stoves and flooring in homes. Currently, most of the homes have dirt floors covered with coffee bags, straw mats, or anything they can find to cover the dirt; kids who live in homes with dirt floors are exposed to fecal matter, worms, protozoa, and other parasites. This leads to diarrhea, anemia, malnutrition, dehydration, cognitive disorders, and developmental disabilities. Most families cook on open fires resulting in health issues such as early childhood pneumonia, emphysema, lung cancer, bronchitis, cardiovascular disease, and low birth weight. Reduced fuel consumption allows a family to spend their hard-earned money in a more sustainable way.
