THE NOVA SOUTHEASTERN UNIVERSITY MACE

HISTORY OF THE MACE

During the Middle Ages, the mace was an effective weapon in battle and also was displayed as a symbol to command order during royal gatherings, religious ceremonies, and university classes. As newer and more powerful military arms were created, however, the mace progressed into a symbol of authority and today is frequently used to lead religious and academic processions.

The mace was originally a wooden staff carried by royal messengers as a symbol to preserve order and usher royal functions. The early wooden staff of such royal messengers or lead ushers of ceremonial processions was transformed in the 14th century into an elaborate sterling silver mace. Eventually, in the 15th century, it evolved into a symbol of academic excellence and dignity.

NSU'S MACE

Before its merger in 1994 with Southeastern University of the Health Sciences, Nova University's mace bore a sterling silver "nova star" symbolizing the university's name and mission. Symbolically, Nova University's "nova star" burned brightly, providing educational enlightenment to the world. Today, a new sterling silver mace highlights the past, present, and future through the inclusion of the original "nova star" representing the university's past, surrounding the NSU seal. When not in official use, the mace is displayed in the rotunda of the William and Norma Horvitz Administration Building.

In Latin, "nova" means new or innovative. Nova Southeastern University was created to be an innovative educational institution—to take the best of traditional education from the past and mold it to fit the needs of students for today and tomorrow.

James Farquhar Award

Lorena Mesquita Ragonesi, an international student from Belo Horizonte, Brazil, is majoring in neuroscience and receiving minors in research studies, data analytics, and honors transdisciplinary studies. While at NSU, Ragonesi was a presidential scholar, Razor's Edge Research scholar, and Farquhar Honors College scholar. She served as president of the Nu Rho Psi Honors Society (2023–2024), executive board member of the Razor's Edge Research Scholars Program, and was recognized as a Dean's List recipient every semester throughout her undergraduate career.

At NSU, Ragonesi was very active on campus and within the community. She was a research assistant during her sophomore year, studying the effects of a nutritional supplement on teenager cognition under the guidance of Jaime Tartar. Ph.D., M.A., and Jonathan Banks, Ph.D., M.S. In her junior and senior years, she completed and successfully defended her honors thesis, titled "Strength in a Pinch: Sex Differences in Detection of and Responses to Threats," under the guidance of Allie Holschbach, Ph.D. She worked on campus as a first-year experience peer leader (2021), research methods in neuroscience laboratory assistant (2022-2023), and course-based tutor (2022-2024). She volunteered as a team leader for Science Alive, developing and conducting science activities with Nova Blanche Forman Elementary School students (2023).

Outside of NSU, Ragonesi was selected for the Summer Neuroscience Internship Program at the University of Florida. She conducted full-time research in the lab of Karina Alviña, Ph.D., and presented her findings on the "Neurobehavioral effects of overexpressing the myokine Irisin in the hippocampus of an Alzheimer's disease mouse model" (2023). She also volunteers as director of research and outreach for Science Clubs Brazil, an organization that aims to democratize access to scientific literacy for high school students in Brazil.

After graduation, Ragonesi will pursue her Doctor of Philosophy in Neuroscience at the University of Cincinnati, in Ohio. Her goals are to continue giving back to her community and to travel the world, sharing her research and passion for science with others.

Alexis I. Lass, a political science major with minors in philosophy and psychology, is from Sunrise, Florida. She is a member of the Farquhar Honors College, a Dean's Scholarship recipient, and has been recognized on the Dean's List multiple times throughout her accelerated, three-year undergraduate career.

Lass served as a cocaptain on the mock trial team while also having an active attorney role for three years. She was position paper chief editor on the NSU Model United Nations Team: the Nova International Relations Association (NIRA)—an academic simulation of the world's only international organization dedicated to international peace, security, and development—while also competing at numerous conferences. She served as public relations chair for both the Phi Alpha Delta Pre-Law fraternity and Pi Sigma Alpha, The National Political Science Honor Society. She was also a member of Psi Chi, The International Honor Society in Psychology.

Lass began working as a research assistant in the Reasoning, Person-Perception, and Morality Lab, in the winter term of her freshman year, with her now research mentor and honors thesis adviser Justin Landy, Ph.D., M.A. After identifying her interdisciplinary research interest in the morality of war, they created a research project designed to evaluate the role aggressor nations play in laypeople's categorization of war crimes. Additionally, she worked closely with

Landy to create a new political psychology class in the Department of Psychology and Neuroscience, which began in winter 2024, and, under the guidance of Ransford Edwards, Ph.D., M.S., she spent her second year at NSU researching the role public opinion has in shaping Supreme Court decisions. This research was presented at the Pi Sigma Alpha 2023 National Student Research Conference, the Florida Political Science Association 2023 Annual Meeting, and the 2023 NSU Undergraduate Student Symposium.

Outside the classroom, Lass was selected as one of four fellows for the Center for Applied Humanities' IN-SIGHT Student Think Tank, working with her peers to research a solution to beach pollution through humanities-based approaches. Lass has also worked closely with the center as the creator of a banned book series, "Out of Sight, Not Out of Mind," fostering monthly discussions with the community on how to fight for free education, as well as the content of various banned books. She has also worked as a legal assistant at a local law firm for two years.

After graduating, Lass plans to take a gap year before pursuing a Juris Doctor degree in fall 2025. During this time, she intends to focus on research publication and law school applications and will seek work in the nonprofit sector.

Bella Christine Giaquinto, a communications major, is from Ocala, Florida. While at NSU, Giaquinto has been a journalist and sports editor for *The Current*, NSU's student newspaper and served as public relations chair for NSU's Public Relations Student Society of America (PRSSA) chapter. Giaquinto's undergraduate work has landed her some incredible opportunities outside of NSU, as she is also the public relations intern at the mayor's office in Fort Lauderdale. Giaquinto received the Dean's Scholarship, was

a 2024 James Farquhar Award Nominee, and made the Dean's List several semesters throughout her undergraduate career.

Giaquinto has reshaped the sports desk for *The Current* while working closely with her peers to produce compelling stories for the newspaper, including excellent pieces on name, image, and likeness at NSU and the use of analytics in our athletics department. Furthermore, she broke the story of the United Soccer League (USL) Super League, bringing a women's professional soccer team to NSU before the *Sun Sentinel* or the *Miami Herald*.

Giaquinto's leadership at *The Current*; her involvement in professional organizations, such as the Public Relations Student Society of America; and her community-based work, such as the mayor's office, have all contributed to her scholarly excellence in journalism. Additionally, her work in building relationships with NSU's athletics department and athletes has uplifted the university's sports community. Working with integrity and discipline, she now mentors and oversees others wishing to learn those standards.

After graduation, Giaquinto will start her master's degree in the fall of 2024 but is undecided about the university. Her goal is to build a career in the sports public relations field before pursuing her Doctor of Philosophy degree.

Courtney White, a double major in chemistry and marine biology, with minors in marine ecology and honors transdisciplinary studies, comes to NSU from Canton, Michigan, She has been involved in research throughout her undergraduate studies. As a member of the Farquhar Honors College, she completed an honors thesis with Dimitri Giarikos, Ph.D. (Department of Chemistry and Physics), and Amy C. Hirons, Ph.D. (Department of Marine and Environmental Sciences), on persistent organic pollutants in northern fur seals. She hopes to apply her findings to future long-term monitoring efforts of both legacy and emerging contaminants in marine mammal populations. In addition to

presenting this research at NSU's Undergraduate Student Symposium, White presented data at the American Chemical Society's Spring 2024 Meeting in New Orleans.

White is a National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Educational Partnership Program with Minority Serving Institutions (EPP/MSI) Undergraduate Scholar. Through this program, she researched nutrient biogeochemistry, in Florida Bay, and studied persistent organic pollutants in humpback and North Atlantic right whales, and presented her findings at the Alaska Marine Science Symposium in February 2024. In 2023, she was awarded the Barry Goldwater Scholarship, a prestigious recognition granted to the nation's next generation of research leaders in the natural sciences, engineering, and mathematics.

During her time at NSU, White served as a member of the Honors Student Advisory Board, where she worked with a select group of her honors peers and Andrea Nevins, Ph.D., M.F.A., dean of the Farquhar Honors College, to enhance the college. She helped coordinate the Honor Your Mental Health Initiative and began the process of establishing a mentorship program that pairs honors students with high school mentees. White is a multiyear recipient of the Honors Highly Engaged Award and was recognized with the Distinguished Student Scholarship, in 2022, and the Honors Living the Values Award: Research and Scholarship, in 2023. She is a member of the Phi Kappa Phi and Alpha Chi National Honor Societies and will graduate with Bachelor of Science degrees in Chemistry and in Marine Biology, both with Honors, as well as an Honors Research Citation. She earned the Dean's List distinction for all eight of her semesters at NSU.

White was the treasurer of both the Chemistry Club and the NSU Marine Biology Club and served as co-vice president of the undergraduate chapter of the American Association of University Women. She is employed as a research assistant for the Florida Department of Environmental Protection under a grant

for NSU researchers Amy Hirons, Ph.D., and Dimitrios Giarikos, Ph.D. This research investigates the potential environmental impacts of heavy metal contamination on the sediment and associated coral reef communities near Port Everglades. in Florida She is also a tutor with Learn to Be, a nonprofit organization that connects kids from underserved communities with volunteer tutors. After graduation, White will pursue her Doctor of Philosophy in Environmental Chemistry.

As an aspiring dental educator, Chandra broadened her research experience by working with the Department of Pediatric Dentistry on a study aimed at oral care activities for individuals with autism spectrum disorder (ASD). During her time at NSU, Chandra has also worked in research focused on X-ray crystallography with Russel Driver, Ph.D., studied the role of stem cell therapy on craniofacial deformities with Carolina Duarte, D.D.S., Ph.D., analyzed the impact culture and the environment have on the human microbiome with Andrew Ozga, Ph.D., M.A., and explored dental epidemiology with Sajish Kuriakose, D.M.D.

For this work, he has presented posters at the NSU Undergraduate Student Symposium in 2023 and 2024 and at the Tiny Earth Research Conference, in Wisconsin, in December 2023.

Outside of the university, Peddiboyina volunteers at a local hospice center, providing comfort care to the aging population of Davie, going beyond his role with the development of a partnership with a Veterans Resource Center and ProMedica Hospice, in which healthy veterans are paired up with veterans under hospice care, providing relief to

JOHN PAUL, J.D., has distinguished himself as a fighter for over a decade, focusing on achieving justice for victims and public safety for the citizens of the state of Florida. His career in public service began as a prosecutor in the 17th Circuit, and later in the 9th Circuit, where he handled thousands of cases, recovering millions of dollars in restitution for victims. Through his tireless commitments, Paul has prevented crime by educating the citizens of Florida on the latest tactics of scammers. He has also instructed hundreds of law enforcement officers on financial crime issues and best practices. Paul has been a law enforcement adviser to the Department of Financial Services in the Office of General Counsel. Due to his dedicated efforts, he now serves in the Florida Office of the Attorney General as the senior assistant statewide prosecutor assigned to the General Cyber Fraud Enforcement Unit. His focus is prosecuting major cyber fraud cases, including the emerging issues related to the use of complex computer,

ACADEMIC ATTIRE

Ceremonial garments worn at academic functions take their meaning from the original centers of learning of the western world in the church of the Middle Ages. Caps, hoods, and gowns of the early students and monks have been held through the centuries to be traditionally symbolic of the scholarly devotion so basic to education and to the deliberate and orderly evolution of knowledge.

The introduction of classical studies, the gradual rise of the great universities across Europe, and the ever-increasing awareness of the decisive role of education in the entire development of civilization influenced leaders among academicians in their desire for a singular identity. In the attempt to create this differentiation, educators fell upon the medieval system of classic heraldry, whereby the coat of arms, assorted ornamental trappings, and patterns of colorful design had been adopted to denote the distinctive character of designated chivalric orders. The function of a pedagogical heraldry became, then, simply identification. As such, measures were taken to signify through distinctive markings on the academicians' attire the institution that had granted the degree, the field of learning in which the degree had been earned, and the level of the degree, e.g., bachelor's, master's, or doctorate.

Of the three pieces of academic attire—the cap, the gown, and the hood—it is the hood that offers the most abundant and most readily discernible information about its owner. The inner lining of the hood identifies the institution at which the individual earned the degree. Some schools have adopted two-color patterns and introduced chevrons and bars in various designs to set themselves apart from other institutions. The velvet trim bordering the hood indicates the major field of learning, or faculty, in which the degree has been earned. The list at the conclusion of this section will explain this relationship. A final feature of the hood concerns its length and width and distinguishes further between holders of bachelor's, master's, and doctoral degrees. The length of the hood for the bachelor's degree is three feet, closed at the bottom, and with a velvet border of two inches. At Nova Southeastern University, however, individuals receiving a bachelor's degree do not wear a hood. A master's degree holder has a hood three and one-half feet in length with a three-inch wide border, and the hood is slit at the bottom. Those individuals with a doctoral degree wear a hood four feet in length, open at the bottom with a five-inch border.

The cut of the gown aids in differentiating between the three levels of degrees. The bachelor's gown is relatively simple and falls in straight lines from an elaborate yoke. It may be recognized most readily by the long, pointed sleeves. The master's gown is somewhat fuller and bears no adornment. The sleeves are oblong in shape and open at the wrist, with the rear part of the oblong square cut, while the front edge has a cutaway arc. The doctor's gown is more elaborate, with velvet panels down the front and around the neck of the garment. The sleeves are bell-shaped at the end and have three bars of the same material as the front panels at the upper portion of the arm. It is cut rather fully and may be ornamental in color.

The mortarboard or Oxford-type cap has been adopted throughout most universities in the United States, although tams have become increasingly fashionable to denote holders of the doctoral degree. Colored tassels are usually worn by holders of the bachelor's and master's degrees. These denote the field of learning.

The color, indeed, the flamboyance, of academic dress undoubtedly adds to the sense of occasion at academic ceremonies. But as its historical roots show, it has a much deeper significance. It is an outward sign of the universal-

ity of universities, and of their responsibility for certain timeless values essential to the freedom of inquiry: tolerance of alternative views and courage in maintaining one's own tirelessness in the pursuit of truth and the free exchange of knowledge. Its wearing also marks the responsibility of the new graduate to maintain and uphold these ideals. These fundamentals of academic freedom have not been threatened in this country for more than 200 years, but the importance attached to the donning of traditional academic dress was underlined in recent years by scholars from Central and Eastern Europe. During the Cold War, the scholars' use of academic robes became a symbol of their refusal to be dominated completely by political forces and the state and symbolized their persistent links to the worldwide community of scholars. Thus, the wearing of academic dress should be seen not simply as a sign of achievement, but as a symbol of the responsibility that falls on all members of universities.

HONORS

Students wear cords, pins, sashes, and medallions that reflect institutional and national academic honors, as well as campus leadership, service, and engagement.

COLOR OF HOODS

The colors found on the hoods worn in the academic procession represent the candidate's discipline of study.
